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Daylighting Urban Streams: Nature Based Solutions for Climate Resilience and Justice

Dr. Luna Khirfan is an Associate Professor at the School of Planning, University of Waterloo, Canada. Her research explores the intersection of public engagement, policy making, and climate change



adaptation, with a strong emphasis on climate justice. She develops coupled human-natural systems models to inform planning and policy while accounting for equity and resilience. Dr. Khirfan's current work investigates the daylighting (de-culverting) of urban streams (restoring buried waterways and reintegrating them into urban landscapes) as a nature-based solution for climate change adaptation and mitigation. She also serves as coinvestigator on the Urban Futures project, which examines climate resilience strategies in African cities. Her expertise has been recognized globally through her contributions to recent chapters of the report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (2022) and the UN-Habitats' World Cities Report: Cities and Climate Action (2024).

As cities confront the escalating impacts of the climate crisis, nature-based solutions (NbS) are emerging as powerful strategies for resilience. Among these, "daylighting" buried urban streams (restoring waterways that were culverted during rapid urbanization) has gained global attention. This presentation explores why daylighting matters and how different approaches shape

its outcomes for climate adaptation, mitigation, and urban livability.

Through a comparative lens, the presentation examines two contrasting cases: Seoul's Cheonggyecheon restoration in South Korea, a bold mega-project that uncovered over six kilometers of stream, and Zürich's bachkonzept policy in Switzerland, which has incrementally daylighted more than 25 kilometers of smaller stream segments since 1988. Despite stark differences in scale, timing, and cost, both interventions

have transformed their cities, though in distinct ways. Neither fits neatly into conventional models of abrupt or directed transformations; instead, they reveal nuanced pathways for reintegrating natural systems into dense urban fabrics.



The findings highlight how daylighting can deliver multiple benefits: reducing flood risk, cutting greenhouse gas emissions by reclaiming auto-oriented spaces for transit and active mobility, and restoring socio-cultural connections to water. These lessons underscore that while the climate crisis demands urgent action,



transformative change can take many forms, whether disruptive or incremental. For planners, policymakers, and communities, daylighting offers a compelling example of how cities can adapt and thrive by working with nature rather than against it.

President's Message

Welcome to the new year! I hope everyone enjoyed a happy Christmas & Solstice holiday – we anxiously await the Christmas Bird Count results. As I have noted, it is our 71st Christmas bird count -- quite a milestone!

I was delighted to see over 100 people in attendance at our November General Meeting, it has been a long time since Covid knocked our numbers back but between a great topic (Honeybees & wild bees), guests and the new Nature Sk butterfly guidebook on sale, people had a lot of reasons to come out - it was wonderful to see!

I want to acknowledge our own Jan Shadick who received the Nature Saskatchewan Conservation Award at the 2025 Fall Meet. As we know and appreciate, Jan is the founder and executive director for Living Sky Wildlife Rehabilitation since its inception in 2010. It is the largest wildlife rehabilitation facility in Saskatchewan. Jan is very well deserving. Thank you as well to her nominators who ensured that Jan received appropriate recognition!

I've also received some interesting notes over the past few weeks — I think they deserve your particular attention. At the general meeting I talked about an email from Dr. Leanne Grieves asking about the possibility of donations/loans of binoculars for her senior ornithology class. I just got an update from Leanne saying that she just heard from her department that they have come up with a funding mechanism to purchase binoculars for the ornithology class. Great news so we are all good! Second, we got an email from the City insect people about the

Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) insect asking that when we birders are out and about to please keep our eyes open for signs of this pest. The City suggests that woodpeckers

can be valuable allies in early detection. In areas where EAB is present, woodpeckers often feed on the larvae living beneath the bark causing "blonding". For further explanation go to the

So, the book for this cold and dark month is Flight of the Godwit by Bruce Beehler. It's a fascinating read of the summer travels the author undertook a few years ago during Covid. His goal was to learn more about his favourite shorebird, the Hudsonian Godwit and what he calls the magnificent seven or the shorebird royalty, species that mostly make their way through Saskatchewan each year. In fact, he writes of stopping in Moose Jaw and Saskatoon areas to observe many of these shorebirds. Interestingly, he makes a small plea for birders to have their hearing testing regularly, so we don't miss the quieter or distant birdsongs - good point! I'm reminded of a note Stan Shadick sent to me a few years ago about the Hudsonian Godwit (HUGO). Stan wrote: "Way back in the summer of 1973, I worked as a summer student for the Canadian Wildlife Service. That summer I was shown the remarkable concentration of many hundreds of migrating Hudsonian Godwits at Porter Lake.

Some experts then suggested that perhaps 10% of the world's population of Hudsonian Godwits was using that lake.

I have visited Porter Lake on several occasions in recent years and normally find at most a very small number of HUGO individuals. I have never found more than a few individuals in recent years."

Beehler's writing inspires us to look forward to the spring and fall as these migratory birds fly amazing distances each year. We know our region plays a big part of these annual journeys. He urges us to step up and protect our valuable wetlands as much as we can - we know these shorebirds along with the song and grassland birds are at perilous risk!

On that note, I hope you can get out a bit, enjoy the weather, and hopefully see some of the birds that call Saskatoon home year-round!

Why Volunteer to Join the Board of Directors?

The Saskatoon Nature Society has now been around for 70 years and has reached a membership just shy of 500. Its longevity is in no small part due to the dedication and passion of its volunteers. We have many nature lovers over the years whom we can thank for their contributions to the organization. However, the volunteers who have belonged to its board of directors have been essential to its success. I want to provide some brief information about the board and what it does in the hope of stimulating your interest in becoming involved by putting your name forward for our board elections in March 2026.

SNS is registered under the Saskatchewan Non-profits Corporations Act of Saskatchewan (2022). Under its rules we may have up to 15 members on the board of directors. For the 2025-26 year we have operated with 13 members. (You can find their names listed at the end of our monthly newsletter.) Board members serve for a maximum of 5 successive years. Based on this, we know that at least 4 board members will not be continuing the board in 2026. This will create a total of 6 (40%) vacancies on our

potential 15-member board; and there may be others who are leaving for other reasons. This is why we hope you will consider joining the board.

The criteria for becoming a board member are that you are a member of SNS and over the age of 18. You do not need to have previous experience belonging to a board nor do you need to be an expert bird watcher or wild plant enthusiast. You just need to have an interest in the conserving nature and a desire to help SNS keep functioning successfully.

Most people join the board initially as Directors with no specific responsibilities for chairing or coordinating committees or becoming Officers of the Board. Later, you may feel comfortable taking on such responsibilities. Experienced Board members are always generous in sharing their knowledge about how things work. If you do have previous board experience, you may feel prepared to be more active on the board right away.

The SNS Board has the following Officers: President, Vice President, Past President, Secretary, and Treasurer. The current secretary and treasurer will be continuing but we will be electing a new president and vice president, likely from among the existing board members. Our current president will become the Past President.

Although our current Membership Coordinator will be leaving the board she is planning to continue in her role and report to the Past President. We will be looking for additional members to two permanent committees: the Programme Committee (fall and winter speaker series), and the Conservation Committee; as well as short-term, temporary committees such as the Saskatoon Bird-Friendly Team, and the Treaty Land Acknowledgement and Reconciliation Committee.

The SNS Board meets once a month on the second Thursday of the month, from August to May. Please consider volunteering to ensure that SNS continues its legacy of success!

The total funding available is approximately \$2000.00. This amount may go to one applicant or may be divided among several applicants

Title: The Fundamental Physical Science of Global Warming in Less Than 50 Minutes
